More than 365,000 people live there. ———— Population has grown by about 30% over past 10 years



With a median age of 43 years.

Greatest growth from those aged 70-84 years.



32% are couples without children.

<u>Couples without children</u> are also the biggest emerging group.



33% of homes are <u>fully owned</u>.

But 9.5% of households with a mortgage are in mortgage stress.



A strong and expanding <u>economy</u>.

An independent, robust and repeatable community survey that seeks to understand and advance quality of life across Australia's local areas.



Uses 16 attributes to determine community values and experiences, calculate local area liveability and identify future needs.




Also measures health and wellbeing, financial circumstances, local area concerns and seeks ideas for improving quality of life.



Contextualises community views spatially, through demography and according to life-stage.



Custom questions to inform local strategy and advocacy.

Sunshine Coast's Views | Design

What questions did you ask in the survey?

We ask questions that allow place based decision makers to measure the positive impact or benefits that policies generate for society, beyond purely economic considerations.

The questions cover a diverse range of topics aligned with Council strategy and advocacy.

The survey is efficient to administer and takes less than 10 minutes to complete.

An annual national Living in Australia survey provides contemporary external benchmarking.


How many people did you survey?

The survey was administered from 7th to 19th May 2024.

We achieved a total sample of n=1,944 respondents, with sufficient sample size by 6 planning areas.

The data was cleaned and weighted by age and local area to reflect the population characteristics.


The Sunshine Coast Overall Liveability Index was 60.3/100, lower than the Australian average (63.4)



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Living in Place in Sunshine Coast in 2024

This section presents the Overall Liveability Index and shows what the community believes makes somewhere a good place to live and how they experience their local area in that regard. It highlights the liveability attributes where residents local area experiences need to be maintained or improved to advance quality of life in their local area and gives you the ability to explore how the views compare to benchmarks, change across local areas and the influence of demography.




Sunshine Coast's overall liveability – created by combining residents' values and local area experiences – returned a Overall Liveability Index of 60.3 out of 100. By this measure, liveability in Sunshine Coast is considered lower than Australia: 2024 (63.4), Queensland: 2024 (62.2), Reg/Rural Australia: 2024 (61.5), and South East Queensland: 2024 (63.8).



INSIGHT 1:


Overall liveability on the Sunshine Coast has decreased since 2022.



The Overall Liveability Index has decreased to 60.3 from 60.9 in 2023 and 61.6 in 2022 and remains below Australian, QLD and SEQ benchmarks.

Liveability mapped spatially on the Sunshine Coast

Liveability is typically higher in the urban areas of the Sunshine Coast, with the exception of 'Urban A' (the southern urban part of the LGA).



The impact of population growth

Outer suburban growth areas play an important role in housing Australia's growing population.

However, residents in these communities tend to face the following challenges:

- Poorer experiences of road congestion (4.8/10 vs 5.6 across Australia)
- Harder to make their way around with relative ease (6.0/10 vs 6.4)
- Lower sense of community (6.2/10 vs 6.5)
- Lower sense of good job prospects (5.7/10 vs 5.9)





Estimated Resident Population Sunshine Coast





Community safety has now surpassed 'access to the natural environment' as the top valued attribute on the Sunshine Coast.






Avoid increasing population density along the coastal shore. Cheap and affordable housing should be built in inland suburbs with efforts to improve their safety, cultural and educational services. This will reduce damage to the coastal environment, keeping it healthy and accessible for everyone, while providing more accommodation solutions for residents. While increasing tourism and building big hotels on the waterfront can earn the council good money, high rises on the beachfront will have negative impacts in the long term.





Why is housing important?

Sunshine Coast has a similar housing tenure to Australia:

- 33% fully owned (vs 30%)
- 33% mortgage (vs 33%)
- 26% renting (vs 30%)

However, they have a lower median weekly household income, and higher median weekly mortgage repayments and rents.

11% of Sunshine Coast households are in housing stress - the majority of them are renters.




